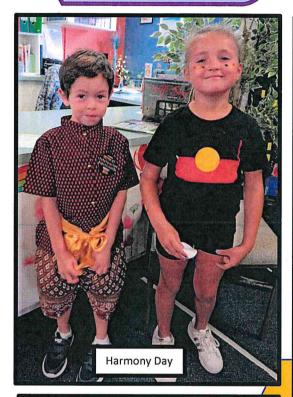
Like all schools, attendance was dramatically impacted by COVID sickness and isolation protocols. 2022 recorded our lowest attendance percentages, however WPS Total Attendance 85.3% outperformed Like Schools 83.5% which is a testament to the strategies and programs we implemented focused on attendance.

Each week WPS Moorditj Koolangas collaborated with Rocky to engage in cultural responsiveness projects and events. As a new group at WPS we are looking forward to our Moorditj Koolangas showing their traditional dance at ceremonies and assemblies.

Linking Indigenous Communities

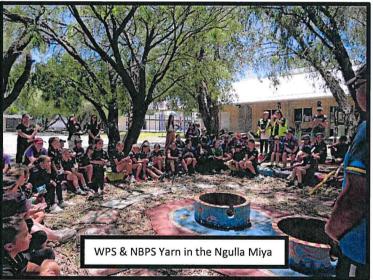
WPS won a PALS grant which enabled WPS Indigenous students, families, and elders to create connections with Neerigen Brook PS. While on an excursion to NBPS, students participated in NBPS NAIDOC opening ceremony where they learned Indigenous traditional dance. In Term 4, NBPS students, families, staff, and elders visited WPS. All participants engaged in a yarn in The Ngulla Miya before participating in Traditional Indigenous games. After a delicious morning tea, students revamped The Ngulla Miya, learned how to play the Didgeridoo and Traditional Dance sequences. In The Ngulla Miya students:

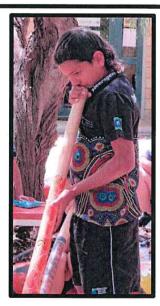
- Created a Mia Mia (Traditional Aboriginal hut) with Gary-WPS Gardner;
- Investigated QR codes to learn about WPS connection to country;
- Created the Aboriginal Flag using strips of material tied to the fence;
- Painted the walking trail pavers with Traditional Indigenous symbols to tell a story; and
- Placed their handprints on totem poles representing the new connection between WPS and NBPS



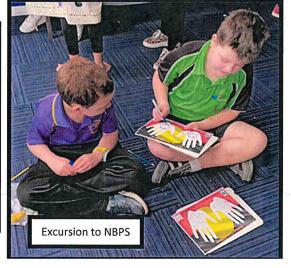

To support students demonstrate STRIVE values, Goodstanding rewards occurred every 5 weeks- twice a term. Some of these included the STRIVE Swimming Carnival, Water Fun Afternoons, Daylight Disco. Pizza lunches, Ice-cream Parlous and Warnbro's Got Talent. Due to our Positive Behaviour Support strategies and engaging programs minimal students lost their Goodstanding. Staff and The School Board updated WPS Code of Conduct to align with the STRIVE values enabling more consistent expectations for students. Our website was updated to reflect these changes. Students participated in Bully Zero, a free incursion during Term 3. All staff focused on positive bystander strategies and how to make and sustain friendships. Every fortnight all students participated in STRIVE assemblies where student leaders led our focus on explicitly teaching Safety, Teamwork, Respect, Integrity, Teamwork, Vision, and Excellence using Warnbro Wakeup Power Points. Our focus on STRIVE for Success PBS strategies, Code of Conduct and Behaviour Management Approaches will continue in 2023 enabling students to develop social skills and reach their potential.

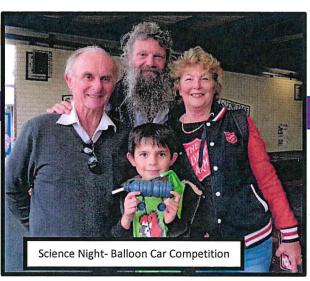

Performing Arts



Throughout Semester One, students from PP-Year 6 attended a one-hour music lesson weekly with Mrs Melinda Leo. These lessons encompassed composing, creating and performing, whilst developing a repertoire of songs that targeted specific skills appropriate to each year level. Students also learned graphic and traditional notation in rhythm and melody. Students used a range of percussion instruments, body movements and voice, to explore different elements of music. Percussion instruments used included xylophones, tapping sticks, drums, triangles, bells and tambourines.

During Semester 2, students explored Dance. Through creative movement, students extended their awareness of their body and experimented with shape, sequences, directions, time, dynamics and expression. Students explored dance from other cultures and learnt about their purposes. Dance lessons encompassed improvising, creating and performing, whilst developing fundamental movement skills and developing body control and accuracy. For Year 5 and 6 students, this included individual and partner dances which were performed at The Year 6 Dinner Dance with parents and carers.

Students in Years 5 and 6 attended the free CO3 Contemporary Dance Program for one-hour sessions over 7 weeks. Students worked individually, in partners and small groups to create a dance piece that they showcased to others. Students from Years 4-6 had the opportunity to join the School Choir. The Choir performed at assemblies, school events and The Rockingham Senior Choir Festival.

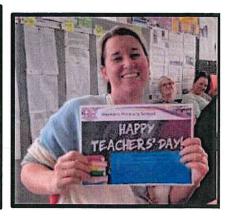
During Term 3, auditions were held for Warnbro's Got Talent. This inspired students to share their individual talents and design their own acts. Warnbro's Got Talent was a resounding success. Students were engaged, entertained and delighted by the talents of their peers. Treasurable moments were in abundance!



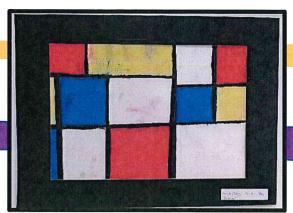








Visual Arts





During Semester One students from Years 1 - 6 attended a one-hour Visual Art lesson each week with Mr. Marcus Vernon. Lessons included students describing and discussing the elements in their own artworks as well as others. Lessons targeted specific skills and elements such as line, colour, shape, form, and space.

During Semester Two, students used their knowledge to view the works of famous artists. They re-created their own versions with their work displayed on the honour wall in the art room.

Students from Years 4-6 had the opportunity to join Art Club each Thursday lunchtime to work on specific skills and projects. During Term 1 the Art Club students created a statue of "Red Ned Kelly" the famous bushranger, which was made from tree branches and rubbish bins. In Term 2 students began bringing in broken toys for the City of Rockingham Cast-A-Ways art competition. They all took turns in gluing on their toys to a large dog sculpture called "Treasure". "Treasure" was displayed on the Rockingham Foreshore as part of the Cast-A-Ways art installation and a group of students, parents and staff engaged in an excursion to participate in the event. During Term 3, Art Club students created a 'Scarecrow' representing farming production and this was entered into the Royal Show and displayed in the Pet Animal Pavilion.





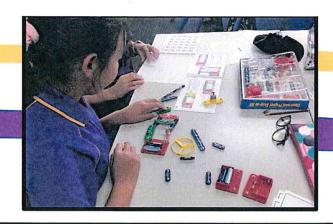








Digital Technology



For 2022, Year 1 to 6 students participated in a weekly one-hour Digital Technology lesson with Mrs Belinda Blackburn. Lessons provided students the opportunity to use design thinking and technologies to generate and produce solutions for authentic needs and opportunities within their classroom context. Both Digital and Design Technologies allowed students to build their problem-solving skills, creativity, and resilience through a range of hands-on challenges. Mrs Blackburn passionately integrated learning area content to ensure students built their knowledge, understanding, skills, and love of learning through rich experiences. Students accessed state-of-the-art Robotics equipment, including Dash and Dot, Spheros, Lego STEM kits, Makey Makey, Edison Robots, Green screen technology, 3DPrinters, and Microbits.

In Semester 1, students participated in lessons on how to keep safe online; explored and learned how computers are made and what they are used for via hands-on activities where they were able to physically dissemble computers to view the components. Students investigated how computers communicate to each other through binary programming. All students participated in a whole school STEM project where they had to produce something made from recyclable materials and sell them for a profit, which was celebrated at the end of Semester 2.

During Semester 2, students continued to delve deeper into binary programming by integrating this with a micro bit to build and control a robot.



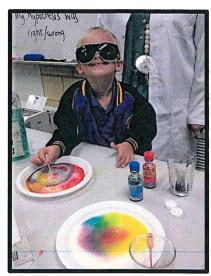

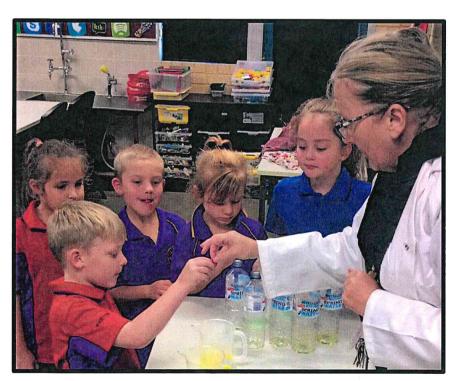


At Warnbro Primary School, 2022 saw science becoming a specialist subject taught by Mrs Belinda Blackburn across all year levels from Year 1 to Year 6. Science is a way of enabling students to explore and answer questions about the world around them. The knowledge it provides allows students to explore the unknown, investigate, make predictions, and solve problems. Students develop critical and creative thinking to become active members of the community and to participate in science-related careers in the future.

During Semester 1, students participated in lessons about Chemical Sciences. They learned about what things are made of and how they could change them through experiments and online learning.

In Semester 2, students participated in lessons around Physical Sciences. They learned about how objects move, what types of energy are used and what produces light and sound.

As Science was a new specialist learning area at Warnbro Primary School funds were acquitted to purchase resources and equipment. Due to Mrs Blackburn's engaging lessons and passion for Science students couldn't wait to participate in their weekly Science lessons.









Physical Education



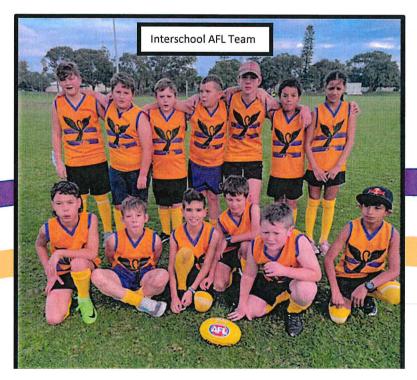


Warnbro Primary School's Physical Education Program focused on Fundamental Movement Skills in the Early Years (PP-3) and invasion and game strategies in middle and upper primary Years (4-6).

In Term 1, students in Years 4-6 participated in the Summer Carnival consisting of T-Ball and League Tag displaying striking, dodging, and specific passing skills. In Term 2 for the Winter Carnival, Year 4-6 students participated in Netball and AFL showcasing passing, kicking and evasion skills in a team environment. During Term 3, Year 3-6 students represented the school in the annual Interschool Cross Country Carnival. The team trained after school at Lark Hill with support from staff. The Cross-Country Interschool Team won the Meritorious Shield. In Term 4 students in Years 1-6 trained in team events preparing for the annual Interschool Athletics Carnivals. Warnbro PS improved coming 3rd overall in the RASSA Division C Carnival.

The Runners Club Program continued this year every Thursday. Students trained in long distance and short distance games and skill development. Other extracurricular activities included the continuation of ROAR Fitness facilitated by a fitness trainer- Bec Houlihan.

The Faction Captains ran a sports competition during Term 4 linked to the school's **STRIVE** values program. Students also participated in the annual Faction Cross Country Carnival as well as the Faction Athletics Carnival which were highly successful events due to parent/carer participation and support.









STEM



Each year WPS students focus on a STEM challenge. For 2022, the challenge was for students to create an upcycled product to sell at the WPS Upcycling Fair. During Semester 1 students researched, designed and created their products. WPS upper primary school students created 3 different businesses in which quality control, profit margins, advertisement campaigns and customer service strategies were points of learning. Across the school our products included:

Students, staff, family members and special guests from The Smith Family then purchased the items on sale. There was even interactive stalls, popcorn and bargains galore. Whole school programs were resourced to support student needs. Termly progress assessments identified student learning needs enabling resources to support intervention and extension programs. The school deployed staff to match student, class and cohort needs across both academic and social/emotional domains. Due to the impact of the pandemic and staff shortages staff deployment was flexible and responsive to whole school needs. Staff utilised physical spaces to implement effective pedagogies including double classrooms and outdoor areas such as The Ngulla Miya. 2022 focused on the acquittal of funds for new technology including 8 Interactive Whiteboards, 30 iPads, 42 Laptops and the Mabot Pro Robot Kit. School funds and grants focused on nurturing a safe and stimulating physical environment with our new LED sign, metal sign, paving, bike track projects and new ceilings in the staffroom, Junior, and Senior Blocks. 2023 will focus on sustaining our targeted use of resources for teaching and learning programs, physical resources and updating WPS grounds.

The strategic acquittal of funds against staffing and physical resources enabled a focus on priority areas- Literacy, Numeracy, Attendance, Indigenous Students, Students at Risk and Talented Students. As showcased in this report strategies included *Warnbro Readers*, *Warnbro Wonders*, *Young Carers*, *Cultural Responsiveness*, *Chaplaincy and School Psychologist support*, *Allied Health Services* and *WPS Leaders Programs*.

Additional focus areas included *WPS onsite School of Special Education Needs Disability-SSEN-D Teacher* Angelet Krikstolaitis. As an integral member of WPS Student Services Team, Mrs. Krikstolaitis refined processes for collecting robust data on students at risk. Mrs. Krikstolaitis also engaged staff in the ASD learning modules, led our Loose Parts Play in middle primary and attended case conferences for students with complex needs.

Under the lead of Deputy Principal Clint McNerney and Special Needs Education Assistant Emma Jackson a case management approach for attendance was actioned with success. Strategies included daily phone calls for families with severe attendance, house visits, innovative transport arrangements, interagency collaboration and termly attendance rewards celebrating improvements and students with attendance rates at 90+%.

Areas of focus for 2023 include sustaining our academic and social/emotional support programs, the continued focus on student attendance by focusing on each family's unique needs and drawing on the expertise of staff experts to engage in PL on Trauma Informed Practices, ASD and EALD.





Literacy Committee







This year, under the lead of Mrs. Lisa Hall the Literacy Committee organised the full implementation of the Diana Rigg PLD Literacy Spelling Program. We invested in online Professional Learning for all Teachers and Education Assistants. We had a strong focus on resourcing the program by purchasing teaching and tracking manuals for staff to support planning, teaching and assessment. We purchased Dictation Books- both hardcopies and online versions to support students in transferring their spelling skills to their sustained independent writing. Early Childhood Teachers requested flip books with visual cues to speech and articulation practice which engaged students in their learning. We also invested in new decodable home readers that align with the teaching and learning program. Termly Aspirational Tracking data and NAPLAN results ratify the progress and achievement students are making in spelling. During Term 3, The Literacy Committee held our 'Smarties' Early Childhood Parent Information Session where committee members Mrs. Lisa Hall, Mrs. Amy Avery, Mrs. Libby Baily and Mrs. Tania Martin used their expertise to provide best practice strategies to enable parents to support their children with reading at home. 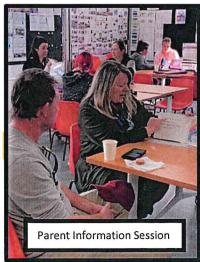




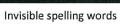

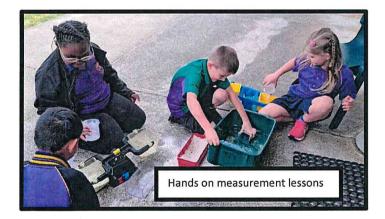


This year under the lead of Mr. McNerney the Numeracy Committee focused on the Number and Measurement strands.

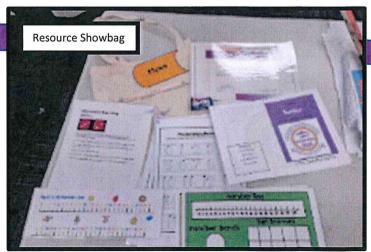
During Term 4, The Numeracy Committee held a Number Early Childhood Parent Information Session where committee members Mrs. Angie Krikstolaitis, Ms. Betty Riley and Miss Hannah Coyle used their expertise to provide best practice strategies to enable parents to support their children using number strategies at home. Strategies included counting forwards and backwards from different starting points, partitioning, number formations and simple addition. Each family went home with a 'Goodie Bag' of resources.

This year the committee purchased MAB blocks, white boards, and measurement kits to support student learning. 2023 NAPLAN data indicated that Measurement and Geometry were key areas that had shortfalls, in particular capacity, grid references and units of measurement. PL was provided for teachers so that hands-on lessons focused on these areas.

During 2022, the Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) and Health Committee continued to consolidate Warnbro Primary School's **STRIVE for Success** focus. The PBS prize hierarchy was updated to include a certificate, **STRIVE** pencil, **STRIVE** ruler, drink bottle, dolphin badge and **STRIVE** USBs.

For Health, the committee led the implementation of events each term aligned to our Operational Plan.

Explicit Teaching Committee





Building on from our starting point in 2021, Warnbro Wakeups- our explicit teaching strategy continued across the school in K-6 classrooms. Led by the Explicit Teaching Committee- Mrs. Amy Avery, Mrs. Carmel Nankervis, Mrs. Lisa Hall, and Mrs. Kirsten Wittber, staff refined their pedagogy with a focus on effective questioning, feedback models and lesson content. The Explicit Teaching Team visited Port Kennedy Primary School to observe their explicit teaching pedagogy which added further depth to the strategies implemented at WPS. The visit also strengthened our connections with local schools. To support our PBS values program, the team created a STRIVE Wakeup which all students participated in during our fortnightly STRIVE Assembly. The focus areas changed to reflect the areas of school routine and expectations that students required practice to action. At the end of 2022 staff completed a survey providing feedback on their implementation, skills, and knowledge of Warnbro-Wakeups. The results will inform the PL opportunities provided to staff during 2023. The success of Warnbro Wakeups parallels our impressive NAPLAN results with 9 out of 10 areas achieving results higher than Like Schools.

Financial Summary

WPS Finance Committee met termly to discuss and ratify the acquittal of funds to priority areas. Under the lead of Manager of Corporate Services Allison Williams, buying verses leasing options were discussed, budgets reviewed, and the one-line student centered funding dashboard monitored. Significant purchases for 2022 included 30 iPads- \$12,000, 8 interactive whiteboards-\$28,400, 42 laptops-\$52,000, the Mabot Pro Robot Kit-\$1,200 and new iPad storage trolley-\$3,300.

Warnbro Primary School teachers engaged in robust Plan-Teach-Assess-Reflect cycles. This ensured that student learning needs were catered for and intervention provided. Teachers analysed and used data to plan for programs addressing individual, group and cohort needs. Students requiring extra support engaged in intervention programs- Warnbro Wonders, Warnbro Readers, Racing to Read, 1:1 individual support and other programs including Young Carers Group Sessions. Students also engaged with expert outside services on-site such as Speech Pathologists, Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists, and Counselling services. Students set learning goals and were explicitly taught strategies to persevere in achieving success. Parents and Carers received regular communication on student progress through documented plans, case conferences, formal and informal face to face meetings, phone conversations and engagement in whole school events. Student progress and success was celebrated with stakeholders. Areas of focus for 2023 include sustaining our intervention programs, upskilling staff on data informed practices, maintaining links with Allied Services, communication with parents and carers and empowering students to set learning goals that require perseverance to achieve.

Student Services is proudly comprised of the Executive Leadership Team, School Psychologist, Aboriginal and Islander Education Officer (AIEO), School Chaplain, SSEN-D trained Level 3 Teacher, Team Teach trained staff members, and Health Nurse who visits periodically throughout the school year. Our dedicated team worked alongside our K-6 students, families, and staff, providing information, additional opportunities and supports for those in our school community who need it most. Student Services facilitate and support student: engagement, learning, behaviour, wellbeing, and attendance, and necessitates a specialised skillset from staff including expert knowledge, strong relationships, and vital access to community networks. Supporting students and families along the path of suspected and diagnosed learning difficulties and disabilities is a key role. Our Student Services Team also helped the vulnerable in our school community to access physiological resources that are no longer available to them and are dedicated to ensuring Warnbro Primary School continues to be a culturally responsive and inclusive community for everyone.

School Psychology Services (SPS) is a valued part of the Student Services Team at Warnbro Primary School with 11 days of service provided each term. SPS provides consultative support to staff and parents to identify and meet the needs of students and the school. Services are provided at the individual, group and system level to support students to achieve success with learning, psychological health and social and emotional wellbeing through the provision of proactive and responsive consultative support, psychological assessment, diagnosis and intervention across areas of mental health and wellbeing, disability, engagement, learning, incident management and professional learning. Throughout 2022 Julie Bergin focused on supporting WPS using a student centred, collaborative, problem solving approach to identify student needs and determine supports to ensure students feel engaged, safe, and nurtured.

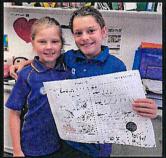

In 2022, WPS SSEN-D trained teacher, Mrs Angelet Krikstolaitis supported students to overcome barriers in their learning. To achieve this, Angelet conducted observations, enabled staff to implement differentiated teaching strategies and advocated for assistance with medical, paediatric, and counselling needs, resourcing and guidance for students and families. Angelet engaged staff in 4 modules of PL totalling 540minutes focused on catering for students with ASD. In partnership with Mrs Andrea Crockenberg, Angelet supported staff to create, review and implement documented plans, engage in the annual National Consistent Collection of Data and action mental health first aider strategies for staff, students, parents, and families in need of crisis support. We will build on the success of this model in 2023 by refining Angelet's roles and creating a bank of resources to draw upon to support the most vulnerable in our community.

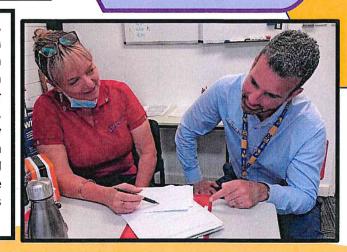

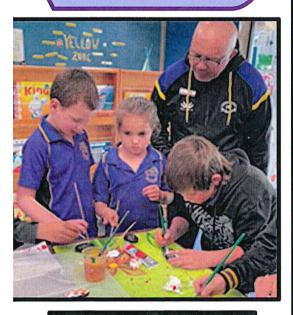

Throughout 2022 Warnbro Primary School provided 2 days a week Chaplaincy support. Our allocated time was increased through extra funding from local churches and the Rockingham Community Council. Mrs Michelle Wilson, who has been supporting the school since 2017, helped students to achieve their potential academically, emotionally, and socially. This included connecting families with essential services and staff during difficult times. This year Michelle:

Worked formally with 270 students and their families, and informally assisted more students, carers and the community through face-to-face and over the phone check ins, and home visits.

Facilitated small group wellbeing programs; WA Young Carers and Zones of Regulation with Year 5/6 students and Developing Friendships with Aussie Optimism.

Coordinated Foodbank, Oz Harvest, Coles and donations from families to provide food support for families in need, Warnbro's Breakfast Club and The Big Crunch and Sip. This enabled the school to provide over 1000 breakfast and lunch meals in 2022.

Linked students and families with local agencies for support such as housing, counselling, food hampers, out of school sports funding, camp, school excursion and school uniforms.

Facilitated financial support from Mandurah Musketeers, Coastal District Care, and other local agencies including Youth Care WA and the Salvation Army Rockingham.

Worked within our Student Services Team to create further supports to build community. Michelle contributed to a range of projects including Harmony week, School Community Days, Sports Carnivals, Open Night, NAIDOC celebrations and our Cultural Excursion to Neerigan Brook Primary School. Young Carers-in school counselling service and the Smith Family Sponsorship Program are integral programs coordinated by Michelle.

As a Youth CARE school Chaplain, Michelle is based in the Calm room; a space set up to facilitate a safe, relaxed environment for students & carers, to calm down, review their feelings in a positive, and respectful place without judgement.

Warnbro Primary School's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander student population reached 9% or 25 K-6 students in 2022. This funded Rocky Davis, our incredible AIEO with 0.2 FTE, facilitating weekly support each Tuesday. Throughout the year, Rocky and his team were instrumental in Building Community providing opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and families to connect with their cultural heritage and share their knowledge and understandings with our non-Aboriginal community. Some of the various ways this was achieved included;

- -Transitioning our three factions from Standard Australian English to Whadjak Noongar names through a consultative process with community members, Local Government Aboriginal Advisory Officer and WPS parents and students.
- -Running Holyoake Drumbeat sessions to support emotional regulation in identified groups of students.
- -Carrying out home visits, informal yarns, check-ins and facilitating conversations between stakeholders, to improve attendance, deliver food and foster deeper partnerships between home and school
- -Launching and developing our "Deadly Dads" Fathers group
- -Leading weekly 1:1 and group mentoring projects with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students (yarns, music, dance, contributing to the Ngulla Miya)
- -Supporting the enrolment and settling in of new Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students
- -Building our partnership with Neerigen Brook Primary School through an excursion and incursion to guide WPS's cultural responsiveness and identity.
- -Leading our Moorditj Koolanga students to plan and run NAIDOC Day and Harmony Week celebrations across our K-6 students
- -Building rapport with parents and caregivers during community events including school sports days (Athletics carnivals, Cross Country etc.)
- -Developing language and artwork for WPS Acknowledgement of Country and future signage in consultation with students and community (staff emails, meetings, classroom routines, temporary and permanent signage)
- -The commencement of EAL/D PL to build awareness and strategies for Cultural Responsiveness across all parts of our Warnbro Primary School Community.

Effective evidence-based pedagogy was refined and implemented across K-6 classrooms with a focus on Literacy, Numeracy and Protective Behaviours. *STRIVE Team Leaders* chaired collaborative teams where agenda items focused on data analysis, teaching, and learning strategies, moderation, student and staff mental well-being and whole school events. Explicit teaching, immediate feedback, effective questioning, and lessons focused on moving new skills and knowledge from short term memory to long term memory supported individuals to achieve their potential. With the leadership of Miss Amy Avery, The K/PP STRIVE Team collaborated for planning, moderation, data analysis and collegiality. The team collaborated to develop termly assessment practices and targets aligned to The Early Years Learning Framework, National Quality Standards and WA curriculum. We successfully implemented the PLD phonics program to engage and inspire minds. The data collected from PLD assessments assisted the team to create targeted and differentiated programs to ensure success for all students. This year we focused on Environmental Sustainability which involved the creation of a worm farm supported by The Student Voice initiative and our wonderful Gardner Mr Gary Withers. Students successfully extended their knowledge by reusing and upcycling items for The STEM Fair. Other exciting events were the Kindy Carnival, 100 Days of School and our Loose Parts Play program. We are looking forward to building on our collaborative processes as a high functioning STRIVE Team in 2023 so that all students continue to achieve their potential.







With the leadership of Mrs Carmel Nankervis, the Year 1/2 STRIVE Team successfully refined Aspirational Targets for data analysis and structured explicit teaching blocks in Literacy and Numeracy. The team incorporated multiple moderation tasks across learning areas for targeted foundation concepts. A strong framework of student support and intervention allowed for visible success in student progress. Building community and familial relationships were a primary focus in 2022, both within the classroom as well as across the wider community through Open Night, NAIDOC, STEM Fair, Carnival Day, Book Week and 100 Days of School. Our programs focused on building social skills, sight word knowledge, reading comprehension and hands on learning opportunities in mathematics. These programs resulted in progress for the cohort and inspired continual reflective practice by Teachers and Education Assistants. STRIVE Team agendas focused on our Early Childhood Vision reflective of the National Quality Standards, explicit teaching, and collaborative approach to Plan-Teach-Assess-Reflect cycles. Our team of dedicated Education Assistants focused on student learning goals, social stories and modified individual and group programs.

Under the lead of Mrs Lisa Hall, our year 3/4 STRIVE Team participated in weekly meetings during collaborative DOTT or after school for planning, moderation, data analysis, mentorship, and reflection. We worked collaboratively to plan differentiated programs based on the WA curriculum. Our termly analysis of data enabled cohort shortfalls to be focused upon and cohort strengths to be celebrated. We planned and engaged in an excursion to the Mandurah Museum to enhance student learning in History and Geography. We implemented explicit teaching strategies through Warnbro Wake Ups and the PLD phonics program. Our STEM Upcycling Projects included Woollen Dolls, Recycled Planters and Wind Spinners. All products were sold out at the fair and students were highly engaged designing and creating their items. We persevered when COVID isolation protocols and sickness created staff shortages and the need for Distance Education. Our positive and resilient mindsets ensured that student learning continued with minimal disruptions. We celebrated excellent attendance and student progress and achievement with end of term Good Standing Rewards. Our focus areas for 2023 will include maintaining our explicit teaching approaches, data analysis and collaborative sharing of programs to meet student needs.





With the leadership of Ms Bett Riley, the 5/6 **STRIVE** Team met regularly to collaborate and provide the best possible outcomes for students. As a team we created and moderated common assessment tasks, analysed data to inform planning and implemented differentiated learning experiences. The team worked to provide a nurturing, safe environment for all students along with engaging learning experiences such as: **STRIVE** swimming carnival, Science Week Balloon Powered Cars, STEM up-cycling challenge, Sporting events and the continued development of Warnbro Wake Ups. We created and maintained a professional, proactive team who supported each other and students to achieve their potential. An important focus area included providing opportunities for students to develop their leadership skills through Student Voice, Faction Captains, Student Councillors, Your Move Team, Racing to Read mentors and Pre-Primary monitors. The achievements made this year have provided a good foundation for continued curriculum development and collaboration in 2023.

The Smith Family Learning for Life Program at Warnbro PS - 2022

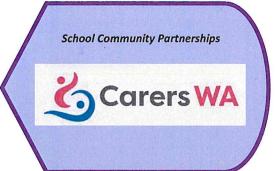
The Smith Family and Warnbro Primary School's partnership provides the *Learning for Life* scholarship to the school community. The *Learning for Life scholarship* is an educational support program, providing financial, social and program assistance to families throughout their children's schooling years and onto post-school study at Tafe or University. Currently there are 26 students or 11% of the school population receiving a *Learning for Life scholarship*.

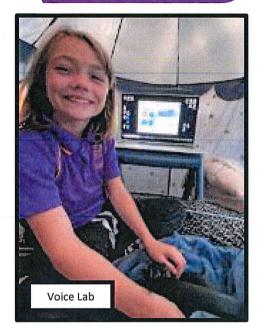
The Smith Family delivers other programs at Warnbro PS including *Kidpreneur* and *StraighTalk*. The *Kidpreneur* program is teacher led and has a focus on building entrepreneurial skills for primary aged students. In 2022 all students from preprimary to year 6 participated in *Kidpreneur as part of the Upcycling Fair*. The *StraighTalk* program provided year 5 and 6 students an opportunity to explore a variety of work vocations through a career expo. This program encourages students to think about post school pathways and future careers.

To further the partnership, The Smith Family was represented on the School Board for the first half of the school year.

We look forward to continuing this successful partnership in in 2023.







School Networks

The Young Carers program helped to support students with a member of their household who is experiencing a mental health challenge, disability, long term health condition (including a chronic condition or terminal illness), a substance dependency or who is frail aged.

Led by a trained counsellor, The Peer Support Groups enabled students to gain support and form connections with other carers in our school. The weekly sessions allowed Young Carers to share their feelings, gain support and learn valuable resources and skills for how to manage stress and emotions throughout their caring role.

This year we expanded the program to include 1:1 counselling sessions.





Warnbro Primary School is a part of 2 School Networks- Peron South and Network 20. Peron South meets twice a term and consists of local primary schools including: Warnbro PS, Koorana PS, Endeavour PS, Endeavour Ed Support, Port Kennedy PS, Golden Bay PS, Rockingham Lakes PS, Secret Harbour, Comet Bay PS, Warnbro Community High, Warnbro Community Ed Support, Peel Language Development School and Comet Bay College. As a collaborative team of Principals agenda items focused on Department of Education Policy, Leadership Strategies, Quality Teaching, Cultural Responsiveness, and collegiality. To strengthen our partnerships WPS Explicit Teaching Committee visited Port Kennedy PS to observe their explicit teaching program and our Student Councillors visited Parliament House with Rockingham Lakes PS Student Councillors. This year, Peron South successfully introduced a Deputy Principal Network with meetings hosted at different schools in the network each term.

Network 20 meets once a term and consists of schools with a low ICSEA including Warnbro PS, Koorana PS, Pinjarra PS, Yale PS, Caralee Community School, Seaforth PS, Grovelands PS, Wirrabirra PS, Dudley Park PS, Ashburton Drive PS, South Lake PS and Westfield Park PS. As a collaborative team, agenda items focused on Department of Education Policy, Attendance, Trauma Informed Practice and Cultural Responsiveness.

As expected WPS is a part of other local networks including Your Move- Active Transport, The ARTS- Music and Positive Behaviour Support. These networks enable staff to stay apprised of evidence-based teaching approaches, events and the opportunity to develop long lasting relationships with colleagues.

Rockingham Council

WPS has a long-term positive partnership with Rockingham Council and The Department of Transport as a well-recognised Your Move School. Under the lead of community member Arlene Yates, The Your Move Team uploaded their achievements to the Your Move Website. Grants contributed to school upgrades, incursions to the Constable Care Safety School and resources including helmets and bikes. Each year Student Councillors participate in The Rockingham Junior Council initiative to discuss important issues in the community and contribute to positive change.

Warnbro Primary School is a strong advocate for supporting the development of pre-service Teachers, Education Assistants and Work Experience students. Despite the hurdles Covid presented in 2022, our school answered the call from a wide range of educational institutions, placing 4 high school students, 11 Mainstream and Special Needs Education Assistants and 20 Pre-service teachers. The experience, skill set and passion of our Classroom Teachers and Education Assistants was central in our ability to provide this service. Institutions we have partnered with throughout 2022 have included Living Waters Lutheran College, Curtin University, Murdoch University, Edith Cowan University, University of Sunshine Coast, Swinburne Online (University), Charles Darwin University, Fremantle Education Centre, South Metropolitan TAFE, Institute of Teacher Aide Courses and Insight Training.

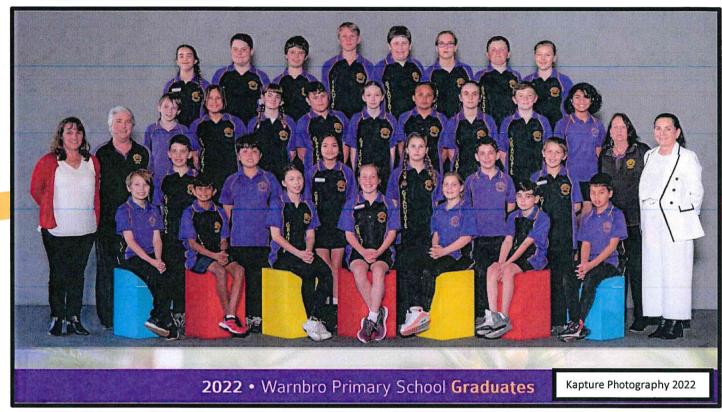


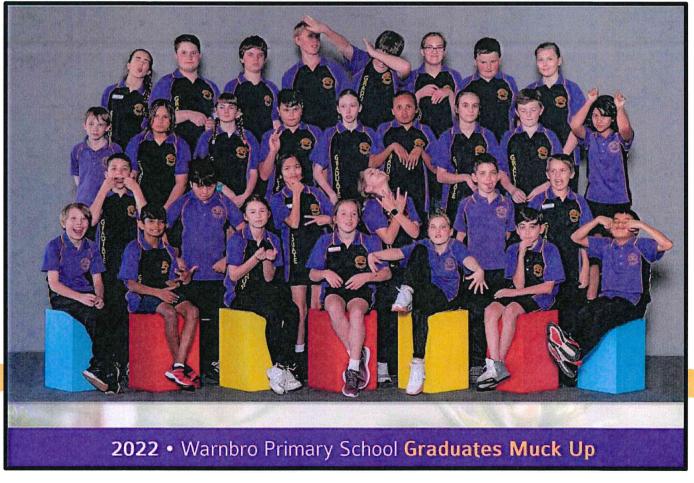
